The Japanese

under my command. I keep wood water  
and a part of my stores below. As is the  
Custom for vessels lying in ballast.

Yesterday being Sunday no one came on board  
to open the Hatches. It will be the same  
at any time when the weather is bad and boats  
cannot go off to the vessels.

I have been in this port about five and a half  
months and the Hatches have not been sealed  
since any cargo was discharged, up to last  
Friday. I pray that you will represent this  
to the Customs so that the cause of my  
complaint be removed.


